**NYSHealth is hosting a FREE conference to bring attention to the reintegration needs of returning military service members in New York State, and to highlight promising and effective community-based initiatives that address these needs.** Since October 2001, more than 2 million troops have deployed to the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. An estimated 85,000 veterans from these conflicts have returned to New York State, with the number continuing to grow, and research has confirmed the significant mental health needs of Iraq and Afghanistan veterans in New York, with nearly a quarter of veterans found to have a current probable diagnosis of Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and/or major depression. Further, nearly half of veterans indicated a preference for receiving mental health care outside of the VA system.
