 - Carol Zicklin '61 Summer Fellowships.







Part II. Challenges to Student Success Strategic Plan Year 2



Financial Aid Pell, TAP, and Excelsior



- Financial Aid only for 8 semesters max!
- 8 semesters = 4 years
- BC requires 120 credits to graduate.
- 120 credits divided by 8 semesters = 15 credits/semester.

Why the Lag to Graduation? Some obstacles we cannot remove.

- Students have complicated lives. Poverty, outside jobs, child care issues, elder care issues, immigration issues, and CJS issues.
- Life challenges can hinder academic momentum and graduation. All the more reason to remove obstacles we can control, wherever we can.

Why the Lag to Graduation? (Some obstacles we can remove.)

- When curriculum is opaque and doesn't follow degree maps.
- When courses/majors have hidden prerequisites.
- When multi-year, course rotation schedules are not published.
- When students resort to taking whatever course is available, untied to major requirements.
- When transfer credits are not granted.


Transfer What If App "What credit will I get if I transfer to ...?"





- Thousands students use.
- We compete with other CUNY campuses for transfer students.
- When we don't grant transfer credit and they do, students go elsewhere.

Credit Accumulation 120 Needed to Graduate



120 credits = 15 credits per semester x 8 semesters <u>Key to Financial Aid</u>

Average student takes 130 credits before graduation

Excess Credit Accumulation The Burden

For many students, excess credits means they:

- Struggle to complete their degree.
- Lose financial aid; stall or drop out.
- Pay for semesters/years of college not needed.
- Lose years of earnings in jobs they don't yet have and if they drop out, jobs they never get.





- 1. <u>Moral Argument</u>: Students come to BC to graduate. We are obligated to deliver a program they can complete on time.
- <u>Financial Argument</u>: Students lose financial aid, pay unneeded tuition, and lose job earnings (disproportionately).
- 3. <u>Reputational Argument</u>: Students graduate angry at BC.
- 4. <u>Retention Argument</u>: More than 1000 BC students drop out each year.
- 5. <u>Enrollment Argument</u>: Word of mouth on transfer credits is hurting us in admissions.
- <u>Strategic Plan Argument</u>: Student success is the core of our Plan. It is what we set out to do. We have to work together to do it.

Let's change to support our students. They need and deserve our support.




