# Tuesday's Talk on Child Rights



The Campaign for US Ratification of the Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC)

### Do you have the Winning Message?

Yes, it's true that the U.S. is one of only two countries in the world that has not ratified the CRC. This alone, however, is not the reason why the U.S. should ratify this international treaty for children.

We know that you have seen and are familiar with the positive impacts the CRC has had around the world. The CRC has helped establish universal primary education in countries like India and Uganda. Systems and laws have been established in many countries to protect unaccompanied children in times of war and natural disasters. Countries like Sudan, Indonesia and Haiti have established standards for responding to children who become separated from their primary caregivers.

In countries like Sweden, France and the U.K., juvenile justice systems have strengthened policies and programs to better train social workers and judges to fully understand and use the best interest of the child principle.

There are numerous examples of how the CRC over the past 20 years has positively influenced change for protecting and upholding children's rights.

We also know that some of the core rights within the CRC, like the right to expression, the right to assemble, the right to access information, and the right to participate are there because of U.S. influence during the drafting of the CRC under the Reagan Administration. ### Article 37:

"State Parties shall ensure that: (a) No child shall be subjected to torture or other cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment. Neither capital punishment nor life imprisonment without possibility of release shall be imposed for offences committed by persons below eighteen years of age."
