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DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT **Dominick Carielli, Ph.D.**

I have been a counselor with the John D. Calandra Italian American Institute, Queens College for more than 25 years. Although my present position as Director of the Center for Italian American Studies is largely an administrative one, I have provided direct counseling services to students on several CUNY campuses, in high schools, and in our former Calandra Institute Career Counseling Center. I work with four other Calandra counselors who provide outreach counseling services on CUNY campuses, as well as at public and parochial high schools.

The Calandra Institute is a unique entity in CUNY in being a service provider, as well as an academic/research institute. The Institute was in the forefront of the multicultural counseling movement during the late 1970s, having professionally trained counselors who were sensitive to culture and its impact on the psychosocial development and functioning of individuals. Today, the counselors continue with that pioneering work.

Unfortunately, many professionals in the field of multicultural counseling have tended to view Italian Americans and other Europeans as one homogeneous group. This, along with some other factors, has led to a dearth of research on the Italian American population. I know from firsthand experience that some of my colleagues were actively discouraged by their departments from pursuing dissertation research on Italian Americans. It is past due that Italian Americans had a place at the multicultural table.

Recently, I was selected to chair a conference on Italian American mental health and wellness, which is being sponsored by the Calandra Institute. This experience has put me in touch with many professionals who are conducting research on Italian Americans and/or are actively working with the population. The response to the call for presentations has been very gratifying. I know that this conference will be an exciting and historic event.

The conference will take place October 7-9, 2010 at the Calandra Institute in Manhattan. The Calandra Institute will host a reception on the evening of October 7th. Richard Gambino, Ph.D., Professor Emeritus of Queens College, will deliver the keynote address. Conference sessions will be held on October 8th and 9th. At the end of the conference, we will have a special film screening of *Canvas*. This film chronicles the relationship between a young boy and his father, as the mother in the film struggles with schizophrenia. The characters in the family are Italian American, and the film is based on the early childhood of writer/director Joseph Greco. Mr. Greco will be on hand to discuss the film, and to answer questions from the audience. We also hope that Joe Pantoliano, the lead actor from the film, will be available to join us.
