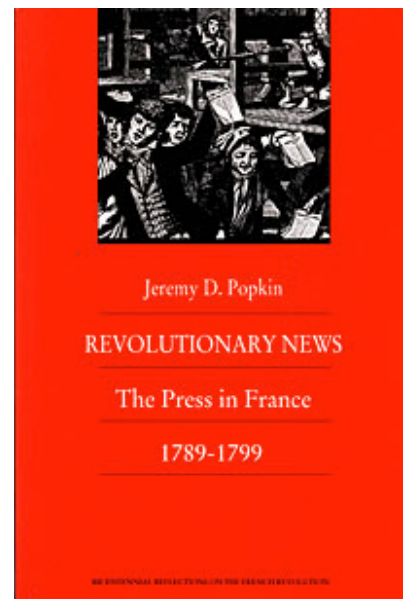
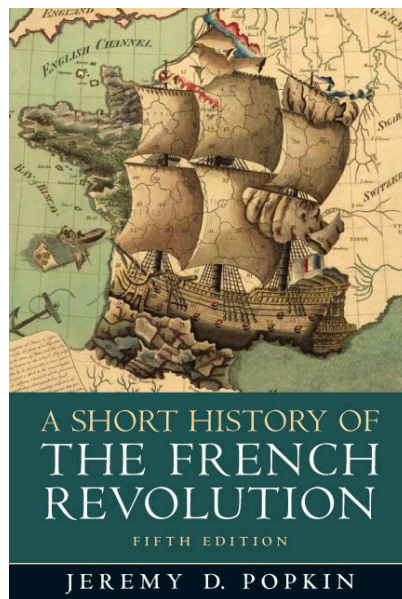
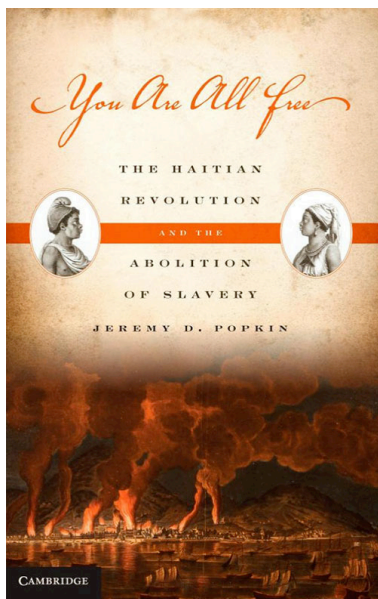

Atlantic Revolutions Now: Thinking about America, France, and Haiti



Jeremy Popkin will speak about recent trends in historical writing on Atlantic Revolutions and about the challenge of writing a “general public” history of the French Revolution in the current political atmosphere--trying to incorporate the new perspectives of race and gender while simultaneously recognizing that the French Revolution saw the birth of modern populism and provides the paradigm for a government that destroys all existing institutions.

Jeremy D. Popkin is the William T. Bryan Professor of History at the University of Kentucky. His newest book is *From Herodotus to H-Net: The Story of Historiography* (Oxford University Press, 2015). His other publications include *You Are All Free: The Haitian Revolution and the Abolition of Slavery* (2010), *Revolutionary News: The Press in France, 1789-1799* (1990), and *History, Historians and Autobiography* (2005).
