Hanoi's Decision to Invade Cambodia in 1978-79: Reassessment Based on New Archival Sources

Kosal Path is an assistant professor of political science at Brooklyn College. He teaches international relations, Asian security, and genocide studies. His current research focuses on transitional justice in post-genocide Cambodia and Sino-Vietnamese relations during the Cold War. He is writing a book on the Third Indochina War 1975-1985.

Helen Phillips is an assistant professor of English at Brooklyn College. She is the author of four books, including most recently, the short story collection *Some Possible Solutions*. Her novel *The Beautiful Bureaucrat* was a *New York Times* Notable Book of 2015, a finalist for *The Los Angeles Times* Book Prize, and received the New York Public Library's Young Lions Award. Her first book, *And Yet They Were Happy*, was named a Notable Book by The Story Prize. She is the recipient of a Rona Jaffe Foundation Writer's Award and the Italo Calvino Prize. Her work has appeared in *The Atlantic*, *The New York Times* and *Tin House*, and on *Selected Shorts*.
