The Asian American and Pacific Islander population at Brooklyn College has increased substantially over the past decade. However, our college does not yet offer AAPI curriculum. Further, since the start of the current pandemic, the violence targeting AAPIs has escalated. A lack of recognition in curriculum or current events, coupled with experiences of bias may leave AAPI faculty, staff, and students feeling disregarded at Brooklyn College. We seek to generally understand: How are our AAPI community members doing? This roundtable serves as a barometer—an opportunity to discuss our concerns, and share strategies to ensure a broader sense of belonging. This informal discussion is not limited to AAPIs, but rather anyone in the Brooklyn College community interested in the experiences of our students and peers.




#### **C3-PONet: Community, Classroom to Career Potential**

STEM students gain foundational science knowledge in the classroom but may be disconnected from real-life application. The NSF funded STEMCEL (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math, Career Exploration Laboratory) project attempts to bridge this gap, like the Star Wars droid C3-PO, who was programmed for etiquette and empathy with excellent problem-solving skills. Come learn about STEMCEL and bring ideas for community-derived problems that could be integrated in the curriculum and provide multi-disciplinary exposure to career options.
