## PHIL 3121: MODERN PHILOSOPHY

### COURSE AIMS:

(1) To survey and critically examine philosophical views on epistemology, metaphysics and the mind, from Descartes to Kant:

- (2) to frame general questions about the nature of reality and the mind, and about the nature, scope and limits, sources, and justification of knowledge;
- (3) to clarify notions crucial to philosophical thinking such as existence; substance; primary, secondary and tertiary qualities; mind and body or matter; idea; abstract ideas; innate ideas; God; cause and effect; realism; idealism, subjective and objective; self and personal identity; noumena and phenomena; freedom and determinism; the soul; skepticism; empiricism and sense-experience; rationalism and reason; truth; justification; analytic and synthetic propositions; necessary and contingent truths; a priori and a posteriori knowledge; doubt and certainty; and so on;
- (4) to provide students with the intellectual background and analytic skills to develop and refine their philosophical ideas about reality, the mind and knowledge.
