Alums Joe, '41, and Shirley, '43, Wershba Play a Part in George Clooney's Good Night, and Good Luck.

There's a very good reason why George Clooney took his script for *Good Night, and Good Luck* to Joe and Shirley Wershba. They were CBS employees during the Edward R. Murrow years, and Clooney wanted their version of the events recounted in the screenplay. He was so taken with their story that he wrote a subplot about the Wershbas' marriage, which they kept secret because of the strict antinepotism policy at CBS.

To make sure he got it right, Clooney flew the Wershbas to California for the filming. And at the screening at the Columbia University School of Journalism, when someone told him that the Wershbas were in the audience, George Clooney bounded over auditorium seats to give them a hug. With Shirley Wershba's help, Brooklyn College showcased the film on March 20, 2006, at a Collegewide event entitled "Making History—Making Movies: The Story Behind George Clooney's Good Night, and Good Luck." After the screening, a conversation with the Wershbas was

facilitated by Professor of Film Foster L. Hirsch, a noted film historian, and Professor of English Anthony Mancini, director of the Journalism Program, and the audience had an opportunity to ask some pointed questions. The companion book, *Good Night, and Good Luck. The Screenplay and History behind the Landmark Movie*, containing an essay by Joe Wershba, was available, and the Wershbas signed copies for members of the audience.

The event drew an audience of almost 2,000—alumni, students, faculty, staff, and members of the greater College community—to Whitman Hall, where complimentary popcorn made the movie-going experience complete.

BCAA Student Awards Change through the Years

The Alumni Association has been giving awards to Brooklyn College students for two decades. During this time, there have been a number of changes. The program actually began as a vehicle for distributing small loans to help students remain at the College. The loans were eventually replaced by awards, initially \$600 per student, in recognition of scholastic achievement and participation in College life and community service. Performing arts students were included. For many years, the grant was given in memory of the beloved humorist, Sam Levenson, '34, and his wife, Esther Levine Levenson, '34, eventually increasing to \$2,000 for each of three student recipients. Recently the name of the grant was changed to the BCAA Student Award.

Through the years, the award recipients have represented of a cross-section of our high-achieving student population, which participates in College and community activities. The students chosen for this honor in 2006 are:

David Ginsburg, '07, biology major; president, SGS Student Government; committee member, Brooklyn College Association; member, Brooklyn College Policy Council.

Igor Epshteyn, '07, psychology major; member, Honors Academy; member, Hillel; volunteer, Coney Island Hospital.

Simeon Iheagwam, '06, business, management, and finance major; business manager and photo editor, Broeklundian; member, National Association of Black Accountants; manager, Women's Basketball Team.

The awards are the only monetary grants given to students by the BCAA. They are funded by alumni contributions and the profits from several income-producing activities sponsored by the Board of Directors. Alumni are urged to earmark part of their donation to the Brooklyn College Foundation for the BCAA Student Award. To do this, simply designate a specific amount on the check for the "BCAA Student Award Fund."

The Alumni Association also hosts four major events annually.

Using an entirely new format, Alumni College Night was held on Tuesday, May 9. The President's Welcoming Reception was in the Lily Pond Reading Room of the BC Library, with a panoramic view of the lily pond garden in full bloom. The BCAA annual meeting followed in the Woody Tanger Auditorium of the library. Agnes Ford, the president of the BCAA, gave the annual report, and the BCAA Student Awards were presented. Dinner was then served in the Brooklyn College Student Center, and the Distinguished Achievement Awards were presented to Arleen Bandel Forsheit, '65, a pioneer in science education for girls in Los Angeles, and Leon Cooper, '49, a member of the Brooklyn College Athletic Hall of Fame. Roberta Rose Wallach, '53, the president of the BCAA during the previous six years, received the Jerome S. Milgram Service Award.

The second spring event honors a class on its fiftieth anniversary, this year celebrating the Class of 1956. On May 31, they enjoyed a reunion supper, featuring a talk by Tony Cucchiara, the library archivist. June 1, Commencement Day, began with a wonderful breakfast in the Georgian Room and a class picture, then the Class of 1956 marched across the Quad in their gold robes. Commencement exercises were followed by a luncheon in the Student Center with time to rejoice and reminisce. Classes of 1957, 1958, and 1959—start planning! Your day will soon be here.

Two fall events complete the year. The Post-Fiftieth Reunion will also employ a brand new format. On Thursday, September 14, we will honor the Classes of 1951, 1946, 1941, and 1936, celebrating their fifty-fifth, sixtieth, sixty-fifth, and seventieth reunions, respectively. Optional tours of the Morton and Angela Topfer Library Café, the BC Library, and/or the Aquatic Research and Environmental Assessment Center (AREAC), will be followed by a reception in the lovely Lily Pond Room, with dinner in the Student Center, where the Alumni Association will present Lifetime Achievement Awards and honor an outstanding alum with the Milton Fisher, '38, Second Harvest Award. Professor and former Associate Dean of the School of Education Karel Rose, '53, continues to help students and colleagues. A Brooklyn College faculty member since 1958, she was the 2005



recipient of the Claire Tow Distinguished Teacher Award. In turn, she has established the Karel Rose Prize for Excellence in Secondary School Teaching for outstanding teachers and education students. With the aid of the Tow Foundation, the prize gives \$500 to each of two Brooklyn College students and to two teachers who inspired them to pursue a career in teaching.

"My motivation," says Rose, "is to recognize exemplary teachers, who are not sufficiently acknowledged for the critical role they play in our country."

Rose was an associate dean of the School of Education for two years. Although she enjoyed negotiating curriculum reform and working closely with Madeleine Grumet, the dean at that time, Rose wanted to return to the classroom to interact with the student body, which seemed to be in the process of redefining itself. "I hoped to be a role model for my colleagues not by telling them how to teach, but by demonstrating it," says Rose.

Rose continues to lead by example through offering the Karel Rose Prize, which is awarded at a ceremony in May. "They inspired my passion," muses Rose. "I have a responsibility to my profession and to the children and teachers of this city to pass on the fire."

It reads like a *Who's Who* of arts managers: general manager, Brooklyn Academy of Music (BAM); director of marketing, Theatre Direct International; theater manager, New York City Center; director of press relations, New Jersey Performing Arts Center; grants writer, Lincoln Center Theater; development director, Bill T. Jones/Arnie Zane Dance Company; and associate director, Artist Services, BAM. These are the titles and professional affiliations of some of the advisory board members of the Brooklyn College Managers for the Performing Arts alumni affiliate.

Under the leadership of Neal Brilliant, '93, (the aforementioned grants writer), this group accomplishes quite a lot. When they're not earning a living in the arts, they're giving back by lending their acumen to the program that helped launch their management careers. One of the ways that they do this is through participation in the BC M.F.A. Mentor Network. Established nine years ago by BC M.F.A. Program Director Tobie Stein, M.F.A., '82, the network has ninety active members who make themselves available to current students, answering questions about class projects and internships as well as giving career advice and being all-around sounding boards.

The advisory board also raises money for the BC Managers for the Performing Arts Scholarship Fund through an annual appeal to the three hundred-some alumni of the program, many of whom work in arts organizations across the country as well as around the world. Each year, the scholarship fund provides a deserving first-year student with a \$1,000 award to help defray the growing cost of tuition and living expenses.

In the spring, the BC Managers for the Performing Arts Affiliate organizes an annual get-together to honor an individual who has made an outstanding contribution to the program. Last year we honored Associate Professor of Economics Robert A. Widman, who teaches basic accounting. This year's recipient will be Adjunct Professor of Press and Media Relations Bob Fennell, a partner at The Publicity Office.

I was first introduced to the eminent sculptor Marc Richard Mellon, '74, at the home of Brooklyn College Foundation Trustee Alexander Tanger, '01, and his wife, Brenda, in Florida. After learning about Mellon's work, I decided to put his name forward to the Brooklyn College Alumni Association Awards Committee.

One of America's foremost figurative sculptors casting in bronze, Mellon is known for his medallions, commemorative statues, and bust and basrelief portraits that, in limited editions,

explore the themes of dance, sports, and family life. His heroic bust of Pope John Paul II was unveiled in St. Peter's Square on October 24, 2001. It remains in the papal apartments. Other commissioned busts include bronzes of former presidents George Bush, Ronald Reagan, and Theodore Roosevelt; the president of Taiwan Lee Teng-Hui; Muhammad Ali; and Albert Einstein. For the past three years, a series of Mellon's bronzes of

athletes have been on display at the Butler Institute of American Art in Youngstown, Ohio. He has received awards from the National Sculpture Society, Allied Artists of America, the National Arts Club, and the Hudson Valley Art Association.

For twelve years Mellon was the president of the Artists' Fellowship, Inc., a charitable foundation that assists artists who are experiencing emergencies. His successor is his wife, sculptor Babette Bloch. His other professional affiliations include the National Museum of American Illustration in Newport, Rhode Island; the American Renaissance for the Twenty-first Century (ART), and the Portrait Society of America.

In 2005, the BCAA honored Marc Mellon with a Distinguished Achievement Award in recognition of his extraordinary body of work. Mellon continues to enjoy his visits to campus and to the Alexander and Brenda Tanger Hillel, where he serves as vice-president.

On November 14, 2005, when Mellon presented Don Quixote, the bronze statue above, to President Kimmich, he said, "Don Quixote is a fitting gift because he represents the dreams that Brooklyn College has helped so many students fulfill."
