



PACK YOUR (BOOK) BAGS, GRADUATION'S HERE AGAIN: TIME FOR COMMENCEMENT! 122 205 Here's What You Need to Know by Jack Ucciardino, Editor





Once found eligible for graduation after filing, students will get a commencement application postcard in the mail during the first week of May, 2005. They should complete the postcard and follow the instructions in order to receive tickets. Eligible graduating students will receive tickets for themselves and up to three guests. Tickets can not be guaranteed to students once the date deadlines have passed. However, when students have picked up regular tickets, they may sign up for guest tickets to live closed-circuit telecast of the commencement ceremony in Gershwin Hall. By May 6, students should have received a postcard in the mail. Those who haven't should e-mail the Office of the Dean for Student Life at studentlife@brooklyn.cuny.edu or call (718) 951-5352 and leave a message for Leslie with your name, phone contact numbers, and e-mail address.



Commencement will be held on Thursday, June 2, 2005, from 10:30 am to noon. Unfortunately, no special parking arrangements are available and space is extremely limited. So those who are driving and arriving by cars should plan sufficient lead-time to find parking. Only graduates with tickets and a gown (information on obtaining the cap and gown can be obtained at www.brooklyn.cuny.edu/bc/commencement or call the College bookstore (718) 951-5150) and quests with tickets will be allowed onto campus and admitted to the commencement area, the Quadrangle. Arrangements have been made to help the elderly and physically disabled. Guests should speak to the peace officers assigned at campus entrances for assistance or ask commencement ushers dressed in black vest and white shirts. As a security precaution NO briefcases, backpacks, briefcases, containers, or packages of any type will be allowed to be brought to the ceremony and all carry in bags are subject to search.

Guests should do their best to arrive well before the start of Commencement because once the academic procession begins, guests will be asked to wait until all the graduates have are seated, before proceeding into the Quadrangle. Commencement Traditions Did You Know...?

- B The first commencement took place in the old Brooklyn Academy of Music, in 1931, and was made up of a class of 89 students.
- B The number of each year's commencement has reflected six extra midterm ceremonies that took place in the early years of the college. Therefore, while 2004-2005 was the college's seventy-fifth year, the 80th commencement will be celebrated in June.
- Students receiving their master's degrees wear traditional black robes and undergraduates receiving their baccalaureate degrees wear maroon robes in the school's traditional color.
- B The school motto, *Nil Sine Magno Labore* (nothing without great effort) appears on banners hanging from the buildings and held by student marshals.
- The Ephebic Oath recited at every commencement has its origins in ancient Athens and signified the laying of the new duties of manhood upon young men, who were taken in charge by the state, then armed and educated both physically and mentally to prepare them for the duties of citizenship.

COMMENCEMENT TICKET PICK-UP DATES & TIMES

Graduates should receive the commencement ticket application postcard by May 6.

Graduation tickets will be distributed from the Gershwin Hall Box Office from May 18 to 24, 2005 from 9 AM to 6PM. Present the completed application postcard and Brooklyn College ID to get tickets only at the designated dates and times. Mail requests must be postmarked on or before May 12. Mail requests arriving after this date will not be accepted. Tickets will be mailed only in response to those completed postcards that are accompanied by a self-addressed stamped envelope. After May 12, you may pick up tickets in person only. VOLUNTEER YOUR TIME - SIGN UP WITH SERVA!

SERVA stands for Students Engaged in Responsible Volunteer Action. It's a program designed to recognize volunteer service by students. Any enrolled graduate or undergraduate student can join **SERVA**.

To qualify for **SERVA** recognition, students must volunteer to work in a not-for-profit supervised activity, on or off campus, and in service to others that is not part of the requirements of their academic major. **SERVA** volunteers can not get academic credit for their work or wages or stipends of any kind.

Other requirements to keep track of your **SERVA** activities include keeping a service log, having it validated and then returning the completed log to the project supervisor at 2113 Boylan Hall to get it verified. Volunteers must also complete at least *four service training units* at sessions given by the Division of Student Life or other organizations and

programs. Students are expected to be in good standing with a G.P.A. of 2.0 or higher to be eligible for various benefits.

What exactly are those benefits? Well, in addition to the pleasure one gets from helping others, there is a SERVA **CERTIFICATE** upon completion of 30 hours of service and four training units within two straight semesters. There's also a Student Life HONORS notation on the transcript of students with a G.P.A. of 2.5 or higher, at least 100 hours of service and six training units within two straight semesters. Not only will volunteers have some excellent career experience to put on a resume, some eligible students will get a mention in the Commencement Program.

GETTING INVOLVED AT THE CIVIC ENGAGEMENT BREAKFAST!

On Friday April 8, 2005, the Division of Student Life's Office of Student Development, and its Student Campus Information and Participation Program (SCIPP) in conjunction with the Academic Club Association, held a "Civic Engagement Breakfast" between 8:00 -10:00 a.m. in the State Lounge of the Student Center.

Students, community leaders, and elected officials were brought together to share ideas for voter and civic engagement projects. The main goal was to encourage Brooklyn College students to become more civically and politically engaged through round table discussions and by listening to the various speakers as they spoke of their own experiences and offered words of advice for students.

The program was introduced

by Assistant Dean Vannessa Green, Dean Milga Morales and President Christoph M. Kimmich. It was moderated by Loretta Chin. The round table discussions covered a variety of topics. Among the discussants were Congressman Edolphus Towns, Assemblyman N. Nick Perry, Council members Yvette D. Clarke and Kendall Stewart, and representatives from the offices of Senator Martin Golden and Borough President Marty Markowitz. Also present were representatives of NYPIRG, the Edward T. Rogowsky Internship in Government and Public Affairs Program, University Student Senate, USS and alumni. They discussed the following questions with students:

- What will motivate CUNY students to vote? What are the challenges?
- What is the relationship

- between citizenship and voter empowerment?
- How do we get civically engaged: on campus/off campus?
- What is the proactive role of students in student elections?
- What can we do to improve communications with our elected officials and community leaders?

Each group came out of these discussions with three main themes that they shared with the rest of the audience. Students pledged to become more actively engaged. They were provided with information about activities ranging from NYPIRG, to internship programs, Student Campus Information and Participation Projects, and ways to contact elected officials, and much more. It was a great chance for students to meet leaders in the local community and become more involved.

order to engage students in the organization and implementation of such projects.

The Health Clinic's Anniversary Symposium brought to campus Brian Lehrer from WNYC. The Health and Nutrition Sciences Department as well as the Women's Center, participated in the Symposium affording students and other guests the opportunity to dialogue on issues of health care. We expect that this relationship with these departments will be augmented in the future as the Health Clinic anticipates increased collaboration.

We invite departments and programs at Brooklyn College to consider recommending some of the programs mentioned here as well as to approach the Division of Student Life for additional information. We look forward to working together toward a student-focused campus.
