## Town Halls Make B.C.'s Voice Heard by Lening Mortimer

Town Hall Meetings have been an important part of the lives of Brooklyn College community members since 2003. Town Halls have helped to spread information and are a great way to build a sense of community. The Division of Student Affairs organizes these community meetings around a topic of interest in collaboration with other administrators, faculty members and student organizations.

BC community members have much to gain from Town Hall meetings. Students are able to voice their opinion and be heard by administrators with decision-making power and have the opportunity to interact with faculty outside of the classroom setting. Staff and faculty also participate and help to explore the topic from all perspectives. The regularly held Town Halls each feature a panel of experts on a chosen topic. Discussion topics are generated from student interests, policy issues, and in some cases, current events. We saw a broad range of topics in the 2008 -2009 academic year, including politics and healthcare as well as the Middle States accreditation process and the search for a new President.

All particpants were asked to complete an evaluation after each

session and provide suggestions on what topics we should focus on next. These evaluations help determine how much the Town Halls have helped increase knowledge of the topics discussed, as well as what could be added to make

#### POLITICS

Make Your Voice Heard: A Campus Forum on Politics and the Election Process October 16, 2008

Planned and moderated in collaboration with BC Forensics, the first Town Hall of the academic year kicked-off with a lively panel discussion surrounding the historical nature of the U.S. presidential election and the importance of student

involvement. The Brooklyn College community convened to discuss the election process on a national and local level. Special emphasis was placed on the importance of voting and the role of BC students in the election process on campus and in the presidential race. The panel featured speakers who have previously run for office and faculty knowledgeable on the topic. Advice was given to students who would like to do the same.

#### HEALTHCARE

BC Town Hall: Our Healthcare December 11, 2008

Health care is an essential part of the growth and development of any nation. However, it is often on the backburner of national urgencies that need to be taken care of. The BC Town Hall on healthcare looked at the global health crisis and the U.S. health care system as a whole. The panelists of health care experts discussed the future of health care in the country and its effect on CUNY students. Town Hall attendees appreciated learning more about becoming active participants in the community all while making a change through education and awareness. A referendum to increase the student activity fee was part of the discussion at this Town Hall.

> THE CUNY BUDGET March 12, 2009

In the midst of the economic crisis, CUNY

recently raised tuition. Many CUNY students are struggling to make ends meet due to job losses and the rising cost of living. A Town Hall was held to address some of these issues.

Recently, 50.6 million dollars was taken out of the CUNY budget and over 1.5 million dollars taken out of the Brooklyn College budget, which has affected the community in many ways such as cutbacks on student activities, classes, and jobs for faculty and staff members.

Town Hall participants found this program to be informative, interactive and timely. They also indicated that they became more aware of the issues pertaining to the economy and its effect on the CUNY system. In addition, they enjoyed their ability to express concerns.

#### SUSTAINABILITY April 21, 2009

The Earth's sustainability has become a major concern regarding our future. In recent years, there has been a strong movement to promote a worldwide effort to protect the planet and conserve its natural resources. This year, BC students, faculty and staff ended Earth Day festivities with a panel discussion on sustainability at Brooklyn College and in the CUNY community at large. CUNY's efforts to conserve were discussed at the Town Hall. "Brooklyn College and CUNY have committed to a reduction of 30% to our carbon footprint by year 2017", said panelist and administrative superintendent of facilities, Joseph Nigro.

The CUNY-wide effort to conserve can be seen at Brooklyn College with the creation of the Brooklyn College Sustainability Council and the implementation of the Ten Year Sustainability Plan. The plan focuses on maintaining energy by using energy efficient equipment and light bulbs; by becoming more efficient in waste management with recycling programs; and implementing the concept of sustainable foods, according to Nigro, who is also chairperson of the BC Sustainability Council.

## Middle States Town Hall Meetings Chart Our Course

The Middle States Reaccreditation Series of five Town Hall Meetings took place in the fall and spring semesters (Nov. 6, 20, Dec 2, March 30, 31).

Students were given the opportunity to participate in the reaccreditation of the college by serving on committees to give input to the Brooklyn College self-study. In addition, two of the the Town Halls were held just for students. Once a draft a copy of the self-study was completed, it was made available to students on the BC web site.

Earlier this year, after 10 years at the helm of Brooklyn College, Christoph M. Kimmich announced his intention to retire from his role as President of Brooklyn College.

The job of B.C.'s President is a busy and complicated one. In addition to being the public face of the college, the President works with academic departments to recruit high class faculty and has an important role in meeting with alumni, local businesses and government representatives. He helps ensure that B.C can maintain its commitment to be the best affordable liberal arts college in the country, while at the same time advancing capital improvements on campus in challenging economic times.

In looking for our new President, a search committee consisting of CUNY trustees, college faculty, and students was convened in May. A series of Town Halls were held where members of the college community could meet with the final group of presidential candidates.

The final four candidates were: • Dr. Karen L. Gould, Provost and Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs at Cal State, Long Beach

• Dr. Hilary Horn Ratner, Vice President for Research at Wayne State University • Dr. Lisa Staiano-Coico, Provost and Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs and Professor of Surgery at Temple University

• Dr. Elizabeth Langland, University Vice President at. the West Campus of Arizona State University & Dean of ASU's New College of Interdisciplinary Arts

Whichever of these candidates is ultimately chosen, one thing is assured - the next President of Brooklyn College will be the first woman to ever hold the post.

#### CIVIC ENGAGEMENT BREAKFAST

At the breakfast the participants, in accord with the day's theme, were engaged in a discussion on the importance of diversity and multiculturalism with a panel of students and faculty. #### COUNCILWOMAN MEALY

Each group was asked to complete a simple questionnaire and when they were finished they all went back into the larger group and shared their findings.

Coming from South America at 16, Alastair Waithe discovered Brooklyn College by just looking across the street. Living near to Brooklyn College, he knew it to be a good school and when it came time for college, it was the only place he wanted to go. Since his arrival, Alastair has been engaged as a member of the Speech and Debate Club, 2-time President of the Business Leadership Society, a member of Student Government, Vice-President of the World AID's Day Committee (which raises funds for AIDS efforts in Caribbean countries), the only BC representative on the CUNY Leadership Committee, a Board Member of the BC Auxiliary Enterprise Committee.a Peer Mentor. and part of the CUNY Pipeline Honors Scholars Program. That's quite a lot after only 3 years at Brooklyn College!

Being active in so many activities has its own struggles and rewards. Trying to balance a healthy co-curricular life with academics can sometimes be overwhelming. Alastair's solution has been to pace himself, take things slowly and to manage his time. In addition to the trophies and plaques he has received for all his efforts, the intangible benefits cannot be measured. Alastair feels he has developed communication and management skills and has learned to lead.

A junior with a double major in finance and economics, Alastair hopes to use his skills not to earn six figures working in a Fortune 500 company but to give back to the community by obtaining his Ph.D. in public policy, working with the World Bank and the UN, and becoming an economic advisor to the Caribbean Community.

When asked what he would tell students to get them more

involved, Alastair responds simply: "Getting involved helps you to develop leadership and communication skills that are transfererrable to the workforce. In addition, being involved is a way to make a difference by giving service to the collegiate community."





## Jessica Huang

Now entering her junior year, Jessica Huang is one student who knows where she's

going and how to get there. With two sisters attending college at the same time, Jessica wanted to go to a school that was highly rated academically, as well as affordable. After visiting Brooklyn College she came away impressed and decided this was where she wanted to be. She is now a double major in Physics and Spanish and on a pre-Med track. Always active in high school, Jessica wanted to take part in co-curricular life at BC as well. She got involved with NYPIRG, the state-wide, student-run advocacy organization and learned that if you have problems on campus and you think changes should be made, then you have to step up and make your voice heard. You have to "stop complaining and start campaigning". For instance, this past semester lessica helped to lead the campaign against the proposed CUNY tuition hike. In the end the battle was not a victory, but it was not a loss either. While CUNY tuition will go up, thanks to the work of Jessica and others, it will be offset by increases in financial aid.

In addition to her work with NYPIRG, Jessica is a part of the Golden Key Honor Society, volunteers off-campus, and will be part of the Peer Mentoring Program this coming semester. It is a program that pairs
