S.A.R. Helps Students Who Need a Hand

Have a question? Need some help? In an effort to be more responsive to students' needs the newly formed Office of Student Assistance & Referral (S.A.R.) was created to make the process of students' gaining help and direction as seamless and painless as possible.

Members of the Student Assistance & Referral staff provide students with information relevant to their situation (e.g., applying for emergency grants), make referrals to both internal and external resources and will personally contact programs and services on behalf of students. In others words, if the staff at S.A.R. does not have the answer you need - they know who does! Maribel Cordero-Garcia is the coordinator of S.A.R. and Associate Dean Jacqueline Williams, the college ombudperson, ensures that the mission of Student Assistance & Referral is achieved. As part of S.A.R.'s ombuds services (an ombudsperson is an impartial mediator between opposing parties, empowered to investigate complaints as well as facilitate solutions), it works with others toward establishing effective collaborations to resolve problems and reach conclusions that will be satisfactory to all involved.

Another part of its mission is the establishment of regular contact with student service offices and academic affairs to maintain up-to-date knowledge of policies and procedures that impact both the Brooklyn



College community and individual students. All this makes it easier for S.A.R. to better serve and advise each student who comes through its doors.

In addition, S.A.R. staff members also provide: oversight for selected student emergency loan and grant fund programs, such as the *I. Mereese Ladson Emergency Hardship Loan*, the *Glaser Emergency Book Voucher Loan Fund* (for international and graduate students), and the new *Brooklyn College Carroll and Milton Petrie Student Emergency Grant Fund*.

The Office of Student Assistance & Referral was created with students in mind as a place for those who do not know where else on campus to turn for help on various issues. S.A.R. offers confidential guidance and referrals depending on an individual's needs. So if you need help, seek out S.A.R. It is there for you!

LEARN ABOUT THE PETRIE STUDENT EMERGENCY FUND

The Carroll and Milton Petrie Student Emergency Grant Fund, funded by the Carroll and Milton Petrie Foundation, is a new financial resource that assists eligible BrooklynCollege students in coping with an unexpected hardship. The primary goal of the grant is to provide financial support to the widest range of students possible, so they can continue their studies and, ultimately, graduate with a BC degree. It also helps empower students to become responsible for their ongoing personal development.

Generally, all matriculated graduate and undergraduate BC students who are in good academic standing, have a clean record in regard to college conduct, and whose tuition is already paid are eligible to apply for the grant. The applications, along with supporting documentation, are reviewed by a special emergency assistance committee composed of representatives from various student service offices (such as Financial Aid, Enrollment Services, Scholarships and Student Affairs) throughout the college.

Some examples of qualifying emergencies for the Petrie Emergency Fund include prescription eyeglasses, essential dental work, and medical bills for uninsured necessary appointments, accidents or surgery. Other emergencies are covered as well, including the need to travel home for illness or death in the immediate family, sudden homelessness due to loss of housing, and documented theft of books, and other essential academic belongings. There is also



reimbursement available for transportation to get to and from school and/or medical appointments and to cover sudden loss of childcare. Just remember, though, the fund cannot be used to pay tuition or debts to the college.
