Announcements:

Under the leadership of Dean Louise Hainline, Brooklyn College has been awarded its first NIH SCORE award. The overall project is headed by Dr. Ray Gavin. Over the course of almost a year, Dr. Gavin, Dean Hainline, Dr. Rick Magliozzo and Barbara Naso, Director of the Office of Research and Sponsored Programs worked to design a program that has as its fundamental goal the improvement of the college's institutional capacity for biomedical research and enhancement of professional development of underrepresented minority faculty and students. The initial award grants nearly \$3.2m over a four year period to five faculty: Dr. Lesley Davenport; Dr. Alexander Greer; Dr. Andrzej Jarzecki; Dr. James Nishiura; and Dr. Roberto Sanchez-Delgado. As the principal investigators get their research underway, the team that created the goals and objectives has begun putting in place the structures to begin implementation and to increase the number of research projects.

NATIONAL ENDOWMENT FOR THE HUMANITIES FELLOWSHIPS: DEADLINE MAY 1, 2006

Fellowships support individuals pursuing advanced research in the humanities that contributes to scholarly knowledge or to the general public's understanding of the humanities. Recipients usually produce scholarly articles, monographs on specialized subjects, books on broad topics, archaeological site reports, translations, editions, or other scholarly tools.

Fellowships support full-time work on a humanities project for a period of six to twelve months. Applicants may be faculty or staff members of colleges, universities, or primary or secondary schools, or they may be independent scholars or writers.

Fellowships and Faculty Research Awards cover periods lasting from six to twelve months. An outright award of \$24,000 supports a six- to eight-month grant period; an outright award of \$40,000 supports a nine- to twelve-month grant period.

The earliest that recipients may begin tenure is January 1, 2007; the latest date is July 1, 2008.

The award period must be continuous, and award recipients must work full time on the project. Teaching assignments or other major activities may not be undertaken during the fellowship period. In exceptional circumstances, NEH may permit part-time awards. Such circumstances might include unusual institutional administrative duties that cannot be relinquished or hardships unforeseen at the application deadline. Teaching is NOT considered an exceptional circumstance. An applicant should not include a request for part-time tenure in the application. Should an award be offered, recipients may present their request for part-time tenure to the NEH staff; arrangements will be made at that time. PROVOST'S INTIATIVE FOR EXCELLENCE IN RESEARCH AND SCHOLARSHIP (PIERS)

Deadline: April 25, 2006

PIERS aims to stimulate research and scholarly activity on campus, increase faculty mentoring of each other, create peer support groups and enhance opportunities for inter-disciplinary projects, as well as to enlarge the College's base of external awards. PIERS awards reassigned time to selected faculty who meet the specific guidelines of the program.

The Fall 06 program has been broadened to include all full-time faculty in any department prepared to write a research or institutional proposal to any sponsor whose policy is to provide full overhead. The applications first level of review will be the chair. Chair approval is required before the request goes forward for internal review. Granted release time to participate in the PIERS program <u>must</u> be

used in the Fall '06 semester. Release time may not be banked for future use. Only faculty with no current full overhead awards will be considered for reassigned time through the PIERS program.

SOCIAL SCIENCE RESEARCH COUNCIL (SSRC) FELLOWSHIPS

SSRC fellowship and grant programs provide support and professional recognition to innovators within fields, and especially to younger researchers whose work and ideas will have longer-term impact on society and scholarship. These programs often target the spaces between disciplines, where new perspectives emerge and struggle for acceptance, thus ensuring the production of knowledge and expertise on

key topics, regions, and social challenges. They promote the diversification of knowledge production, strengthening research by ensuring that it remains open to a range of perspectives, backgrounds, and nationalities.

Although most programs target the social sciences, many are also open to applicants from the humanities, the natural sciences, and relevant professional and practitioner communities. Most support from the Council goes to predissertation, dissertation, and postdoctoral fellowships, offered through annual, peer-reviewed competitions. Some programs offer summer institutes, advanced research grants, and grants for professionals and practitioners to conduct research. The U.S. Department of Education is planning on having a *Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education (FIPSE)* Comprehensive Program competition this year, and a deadline of late May is anticipated. Detailed information will be forthcoming.

Helpful Grant Tips #1:

While there are different formats for proposal presentation, depending on the funding agency, there is essential information that all sponsors require. Throughout the coming months we will include grant-writing tips in each of our newsletters.

<u>Time management:</u> Developing a successful proposal requires conscious commitment of time on a regular basis. Divide the application into easily addressed, manageable segments. We suggest that you set aside time daily and allow no distractions. General estimates are that it takes 4-6 months and 1-2 hours at least 3-4 times each week to prepare the most competitive application.
